


NEWS SUMME LETTER 202

Greetings!

I pray that you are well during this COVID-19 pandemic.

It is hard to believe that the last public gathering at McMaster Divinity College occurred on March 16, when we joyously dedicated our new Cullen Hall as the culmination of our building project. We had over 100 in attendance at this major milestone in the life of MDC and celebrated together—just before we all locked down for our mutual health and safety. All of our courses moved online, and our staff transitioned to working from home. We instigated our COVID-19 Response Team, which has met at least weekly since the middle of March and continues to monitor our response to the crisis.

Despite the difficulties, the work of MDC has continued unabated over the last five months, so that we are now poised for the beginning of a new academic year—although one that is negotiating a new reality. We are being attentive to the needs of our faculty, staff, and students, so as to provide a safe working environment for when we reopen. We are following the best advice of our various governmental and health authorities, with the proper signage, cleaning, and sanitizer stations. And we will all be wearing masks in public spaces, maintaining appropriate social distances, and, of course, washing our hands—a lot!



Even with the world in turmoil, we have been blessed by the response of our MDC community. As a result, we are anticipating a great new group of incoming students this Fall term, as well as looking forward to welcoming back our returning students. I am greatly encouraged to see that, despite the challenges of our everyday world, our students are answering their call by God for further theological education and joining us this Fall.

Please continue to pray for MDC in the weeks ahead. Pray for our administrators as we continuously negotiate our COVID-19 response. Please pray for our faculty as they prepare for delivering our hybrid courses (combining online and limited face-to-face contact). Most of all, pray for our students. They have endured the most during these last several months. Nevertheless, I continue to hear uplifting accounts of how God is working even in the midst of our uncertainty. 

As part of our President's Dinner Online, we asked some of our students—both past and present—to share with us the ministry they are involved in and how the COVID-19 pandemic has affected how they serve. Tell us about the ministry you are involved in.

For the last three and a half years I have worked as a Chaplain at the Salvation Army Hamilton Booth Centre where we endeavour to carry out the mission to share Jesus' love, meet human needs, and help transform lives by providing emergency housing and other supports for men experiencing homelessness.

How has the COVID-19 crisis affected your ministry and how can we support you?

Since our community gatherings were discontinued, we learned to shift to other means of contact—donning PPE at appropriate distances, handing out community meals to those in need with our soup van, and supporting residents with phone calls, Zoom meetings, and using our social media to stay connected! I've been inspired by the way our community has rallied together through this crisis. I'm thankful for a supportive team and for the people I encounter that find contentment and joy in some of the worst of circumstances.

MDC prepared me for ministry by teaching me to read the Bible with a critical lens and to understand it as divinely inspired words. In the practice of spiritual care, I've learned often inviting the right questions is more important that providing answers.

For us at the Salvation Army, pray for more people and faith communities ready to follow Jesus by getting to know our city's marginalized poor. Our men want to be loved. They want to be known and come to know us too.

Tell us more about the ministry you are involved in.

I have worked as Curriculum Pastor for The Meeting House for the last six years where I developed curriculum for kids and youth so they can come to know, love, and follow Jesus. I recently accepted a position as Lead Pastor at the Brantford location!

How has the COVID-19 crisis affected your ministry and how can we support you?

The COVID crisis expedited my transition into my new role as Lead Pastor. I immediately jumped into phone calls to every congregant, coaching them in accessing our online gatherings and home church. I have learned to use the "live" feature on social media to connect with people. The crisis has certainly prompted a season of connecting with some immediacy to our community, which has been a blessing in a strange way.

MDC has been an immense support in equipping me for ministry. When I first started as a youth pastor, I began my MTS and grew in my capacity to think theologically in various spheres—this most certainly helped as I launched into a role of curriculum development. Jumping to present, MDC's broad course offerings have given me a solid foundation in pastoral ministry where I feel prepared to lead my community despite this current crisis.

I would appreciate prayer that I could maintain balance in this season, for wisdom, and for perseverance. For my community, pray for health and safety, and that we could find creative ways to truly love our neighbours during this season.
