Biography:

Dr. Phil Zylla is *Professor of Pastoral Theology* at McMaster Divinity College. His research interests include pastoral theology, congregational studies, theology of suffering, preaching, and Christian spirituality. His current book project, *Spiritual Formation of the Congregation* seeks to develop a communal approach to the spiritual formation of a Christian community. He lives in Ancaster with his wife Melodie.

Course Description:

Henri Nouwen published over 40 books and is notably one of the most important and widely read spiritual writers in recent years in North America. He taught at Notre Dame, Yale Divinity School and Harvard Divinity School but spent the last decade of his life as the pastor of the *Daybreak Community* of L'Arche in Toronto. Nouwen was influenced by early pioneers in pastoral theology including Anton Boisen and Seward Hiltner. These roots allowed him to integrate spiritual ideas with their counterparts in pastoral psychology and psychology of religion. He had extensive training in the field of pastoral theology though little is written on his explicit methods of exploring pastoral theological themes. This course seeks to mine the writings of Henri Nouwen for his approach to pastoral theological exploration as it pertains to contemporary issues in the field.

Course Objectives:

Knowing

1. To become familiar with the root ideas and integrative pastoral theology of Henri Nouwen's works.
2. To explore the pastoral theological themes introduced by Henri Nouwen's corpus.
3. To deepen resources for the expansion of pastoral theology in the 21st century.

Being

1. To be shaped in the inner person through spiritual integration of course materials.
2. To cultivate a personal sense of mission and calling to the work of integrative pastoral theology.
3. To experience the themes and ideas expressed by Nouwen through spiritual practices.

Doing

1. To evaluate and use methods developed in the pastoral theology of Henri Nouwen.
2. To develop new themes in pastoral theology that can inform contemporary Christian ministry.

Mode of Delivery:

Asynchronous learning occurs through online channels without real-time interaction. This course is delivered as an asynchronous online course. Two annotated book reviews on Nouwen's Pastoral Theology - selected works of Henri Nouwen

1st Annotated Book Review Due: January 29, 2026

2nd Annotated Book Review Due: February 26, 2026

Select from any of Nouwen's books beyond the course textbooks. The focus of this annotation should be to open up categories of pastoral theological import revealed in the text. The assignment should include the following information:

- a. Can you identify key pastoral theological insight at the focal center of this book?
- b. Summary of key ideas, primary themes and foci of the book.
- c. When was it written and in what context?
- d. How are the ideas of this book relevant to contemporary pastoral ministry?
- e. How did you benefit from reading this book?

Assignment 3:

Write a **spiritual retreat** based on Nouwen's works.

You can draw from course textbooks or other books by Nouwen, but the retreat should draw from at least five (5) volumes of Nouwen's corpus.

- a. Outline a one day spiritual retreat that is informed by Nouwen's writings.
- b. Plan activities including: workshop sessions, spiritual exercises, worship, prayer, etc
- c. Outline the key aims of the spiritual retreat.
- d. Identify a key audience for the spiritual retreat.
- e. Write spiritual exercise for each session.

Assignment 4:

Weekly Online Discussion Thread - class readings

This course is a collaborative research course on the pastoral theological insights of Henri Nouwen. In order to generate the most critical advancement of this goal it is imperative that participants READ all of the required texts for each module and review carefully the modular primer lecture. Grading for the weekly discussion threads will be based on these criteria:

- a. Careful reading of modular textbook
- b. Insight from interaction with primer lecture and readings
- c. Pastoral theological imagination

Assignment 5 and 6:

Essay and Course Presentation on *Core Themes in the Writings of Henri Nouwen*

Part A: powerpoint outline (10-15 slides); Part B: Essay 13-15 pages

Use at least 5 Nouwen volumes (in addition to the course textbooks) and five other sources (not Nouwen). This assignment is meant to be developed in two parts:

Course Presentation (15%) Due: March 16, 2026 or March 23, 2026

The first part will be an outline and presentation of key themes to course participants. A sign up list will be made available for a course presentation to peers on either Monday, March 16th or Monday, March 23rd. Review posting information on Avenue to Learn.

Essay (25%) Due: April 8, 2026

Integrating feedback from the course participants, the presentation will be polished into a final essay of 13-15 pages (double-spaced). The essay should focus on a key pastoral theological insight(s) of Henri Nouwen based on a critical reading of his work. The criteria for the essay evaluation include:

- a. Pastoral theological imagination

- b. Key supporting information from Nouwen primary sources
- c. Supporting arguments using scholarly literature
- d. Ministry application
- e. Theological reflection and biblical analysis of core themes
- f. Form and Style (careful application of the MDC Style Guide will be rewarded)

Late Papers: Late assignments will be docked 1% each late day. (Extensions will only be granted in exceptional circumstances such as extended illness, etc.)

Spacing and Style guide: All assignments are to be double-spaced and follow the McMaster Divinity College Style guide.

Submission: All assignments are due by the end of day (MS Word or PDF) (11:59 p.m.)
