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### **Course Description**

Mystery, controversy, deep theology and extreme challenge! The Book of Hebrews is one of the least known books in the New Testament but has so much to offer every student. All will benefit from the exploration of its meaning for today in discipleship, community and ministry, and ultimately Hebrews carves a path straight into the presence of God. The core of this course is an exegetical and interpretative study of the Book of Hebrews in English translation. This class involves an acquaintance with structure, content, message, context and other interpretive issues of Hebrews as well.

### **Course Objectives**

Specific Objectives – Through reading, lectures, discussion and assignments

#### ***Knowing***

- The student will know the Hebrews message/content on how to draw closer to God and its use in preaching, teaching and Bible Study.
- The student will understand Hebrews in its social, historical, literary and religious Jewish Hellenistic context
- The student will be familiar with key works and critical issues concerning introductory questions (i.e. authorship, date, settings, etc.) and identify the features in the text that illuminate the options

#### ***Being***

- The student will be spiritually challenged by message of Hebrews.
- The student will appreciate the distinctive content and theology of the text and goal(s) of the author.
- The student will enter into partnership with Jesus in his heavenly calling.

#### ***Doing***

- The student will research and write a paper on a topic or passage in Hebrews that can potentially be presented in an academic conference and published.

- The student will train and prepare for teaching by presenting a teaching unit to the class and by developing a syllabus for an undergraduate course.

### **Course Requirements**

#### ***Class Participation (10%)***

Student participation includes interactive lectures and class and group discussions is expected, based on your readings for the week.

#### **Reading (10%)**

Students will read 5,000 pages from works on the Book of Hebrews. The reading list with pages read will be submitted on Avenue **due 11:59 pm on December 12.**

### ***Written Assignments***

#### **Research Paper (40%)**

- Each student will write a research paper on a passage or topic in the study of the Book of Hebrews.
- The paper will be 6,000–7,000 words, excluding notes and bibliography
- **The paper is due 11:59 pm on November 15**, submitted on Avenue.
- In all matters the student must follow the MDC Style Guide (see Style below)

#### **Syllabus & Presentation (20%)**

**The syllabus is due 2 p.m. December 9, at the time of the scheduled final.** Since this has a presentation component, no late syllabi will be accepted.

A detailed syllabus and lecture outline for a college level course of a specific institution, either a general introduction to Hebrews, or an elective course that integrates insights from your reading & papers.

### **Teaching Unit (20%)**

The student will prepare and teach 1 hour of the course, covering a passage determined by the professor and student. The student will be expected to use effective teaching methods and presentation devices.
