OT 1B03-GUIDE TO BIBLICAL LANGUAGES: HEBREW 1

### 1. Instructor information:

#### 2. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This class (Hebrew 1) and the subsequent one (Hebrew 2) are foundational courses to equip students to study the Old Testament (OT) in Hebrew. At the end of these two classes, the students will recognize basic Hebrew vocabulary and understand the basic grammatical aspects of biblical Hebrew. This foundation facilitates the students to pursue Hebrew Exegesis courses to further develop their ability to exegete OT in Hebrew.

Learning a new language is challenging. Learning Hebrew in a modern environment is even more challenging because the sound and writing differ from most modern languages we grew up with. Learning Hebrew in a compressed timeframe online further compounds this challenge. To alleviate these challenges, the course has been tailor-made to orient students' energy and effort toward essential components of Biblical Hebrew and language theory.

### 3. Course Delivery Mode

This seven weeks biblical language course will be delivered completely online asynchronously through <u>Avenue to Learn</u> (A2L). All the required learning activities will become available no later than the beginning of the corresponding week (Monday morning) in A2L. In a typical week, a student should focus on at least two chapters from *Basics of Biblical Hebrew Grammar* (BBH).

For example, the course schedule at the end of this syllabus and A2L shows that the students are responsible for BBH 3–4 in week 2 (May 8–15). BBH 3–4 means Chapters 3 and 4 from *Basics of Biblical Hebrew Grammar* (BBH). In this example (week 2), the student should

- 1. **start** memorizing the vocabulary words from the vocabulary section in Chapters 3 and 4 on **Monday morning, if not earlier**. The student should spend at least 30–60 mins **every day** memorizing them.
- 2. **complete** reading the respective chapters in BBH thoroughly by **Tuesday evening**.
- 3. watch the lecture video by Wednesday evening.
- 4. **complete** the workbook exercises corresponding to the respective chapters. Scan the pages from the workbook exercises into one single pdf and submit the scanned pdf (one pdf) on the

- respective section under Assignments at A2L by **Friday evening** (ideally, start immediately after reading the chapters).
- 5. **complete** the assigned quizzes or mid-term before their due dates (typically **Saturday evening**) specified according to A2L.

Although online asynchronous class means that there will be no live class sessions, the instructor recommends meeting together as a class to offer pastoral rapport, review workbook exercises, and answer questions. Participation is voluntary. We will determine a time through a survey around one week before the class starts.

Since this is an online course, the question arises about accountability on quizzes and exams. For all quizzes and mid-term, you are on your honor to not use any notes or tools as you take them. However, the final exams must be proctored. You need to arrange for someone to proctor your exams. It cannot be a relative or classmate. It must be a person in a position of responsibility. For example, you can ask someone with an official capacity at your church, such as a church administrative assistant or your small group leader. Your choice needs the instructor's approval. Prior to the exam date, the instructor will email the exam to the proctor, who needs to print out the exam from a PDF file, supervise you taking the exam, then scan it back to the instructor.

Students are also encouraged to meet with the instructors (by appointment, either in person or on Zoom) to discuss any questions related to the class and/or the assignments. Students should expect to commit at least 12 hours per week to the course.

## 4. Learning Outcomes





  - To allow the Scripture to motivate, form, and transform our faith, worship, and Christian way of life




- To describe how choices in language affect the meaning of the biblical text



Workbook exercises form an essential component of your learning experience because you learn Hebrew by doing and correcting them diligently. Please read the rubric embedded in the assignments on A2L thoroughly. Below is a brief description of the two main evaluation criteria for the workbook exercises.

- 1. Completeness Students must complete at least **ALL** the **ODD** number questions in their workbook exercises according to the assignment rubric.
- 2. Self-Correction After completing the exercises, students must check their answers and correct them using a **DIFFERENT COLOR** pen for each answer of the **ODD number** questions according to the assignment rubric.

# IMPORTANT INFORMATION for Vocabulary Quizzes, Mid-Term, and Final Exam

In the context of Hebrew quizzes, mid-term, and final exam, all the answers must be of your own. Before taking the quizzes, mid-term, and final exam, you must put away your textbook, workbook, study materials, and anything related to Hebrew either inside a drawer or another room. Ideally, you should have a clean desk with only the exam paper (final exam) or your computer (for quizzes and mid-term). You may use blank paper and a pen/pencil. Since all quizzes and mid-term are CLOSED BOOK and COMPLETELY ONLINE, you should also have a "clean" computer. This means closing all applications and browsing sessions on your computer EXCEPT the quiz or mid-term you are taking.

## **Vocabulary Quizzes** Refer to A2L for due dates, more detailed instructions, and the rubric.

You will be responsible for learning roughly 250 common words in Hebrew. You will be required to give an English gloss for each. The vocabulary will be taken from the respective chapters of BBH. Since this is a summer class, the students will only be responsible for the vocabulary of the chapters covered in that specific week. For example, in week 2, the students will only be responsible for vocabulary from Chapters 3 and 4.

## Midterm Exam Refer to the Course Schedule (next page) for the Due Date

The mid-term assesses all the materials from BBH 1–8 in the textbook, workbook, and video lectures. Although the mid-term will not directly test your vocabulary, you are expected to know all the vocabulary words from BBH 1–8. Those outside BBH 1–8 will be provided.

## Final Exam Refer to the Course Schedule (next page) for the Due Date

The final exam assesses all the materials from BBH 1–16 in the textbook, workbook, and video lectures. Like the mid-term, the final exam will also not directly test your vocabulary. However, you are expected to know all the vocabulary words from BBH 1–16. Those outside BBH 1–16 will be provided. A review in preparation for the final exam will be available around one week before the exam.

## Policy for Late Submissions of Workbook Exercises, Quizzes, Mid-term, and Final Exam:

Life often has unexpected twists and turns impacting our studies. Please reach out to the instructor if you have unforeseeable circumstances such as accident, illness, and crisis, which may lead to late submissions. Unless there is a valid reason, 3% of the marks will be deducted per day for late submissions.
